**ACCREDITATION TEAM INVITES PUBLIC COMMENTS
ABOUT THE WILTON MANORS POLICE DEPARTMENT**

(Wilton Manors, FL) – A team of assessors from the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA) will arrive April 19, 2016 to examine all aspects of the Wilton Manors Police Department’s policies and procedures, management, operations, and support services, Chief Paul O’Connell announced today. The Wilton Manors Police Department (WMPD) has to comply with approximately 260 standards in order to receive accredited status. Many of the standards are critical to life, health, and safety issues.

The Accreditation Program Manager for WMPD is Doug Robertson. According to Robertson, the assessment team is composed of law enforcement practitioners from similar agencies. The assessors will review written materials; interview individuals; and visit offices and other places where compliance can be witnessed. The CFA Assessment Team Leader is Sergeant Nicole Minick of the Collier County Sheriff’s Office. Other team members are Commander Chris Willet, Altamonte Springs Police Department and Sergeant Chris Crawford of the Rockledge Police Department.

Once the Commission's assessors complete their review of the agency, they report back to the full Commission, which will then decide if the agency is to receive accredited status. Wilton Manors accreditation is for 3 years. Verification by the team that WMPD meets the Commission's standards is part of a voluntary process to gain or maintain accreditation--a highly prized recognition of law enforcement professional excellence, Chief O'Connell said.

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
